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## E BIKE UPDATE

Further to our February 2026 Newsletter article on E-Bikes and Pedestrians [February Newsletter](#)

The NSW Government has reacted strongly to the numerous accidents and complaints about dangerous and anti-social e-bike activity, with emphasis on the growing number of throttle-only, high-powered e-bike activity.

The legislation introduced on 24th March will significantly enhance enforcement capacity for police and transport officers by extending seizure powers. If an e-bike can go faster than the 25kmh limit, it is considered an illegal bike and can be removed. If a device does not meet NSW's legal definition of a pedal-assisted, it can be seized even if it was bought in error.

Minister for Roads and Regional Transport, Jenny Aitchison, said once an e-bike is taken it is not given back. To be legal, the rider must primarily propel it by pedalling – the motor can't be the only thing moving the bike. It should only help the rider, like when going uphill or facing strong winds.

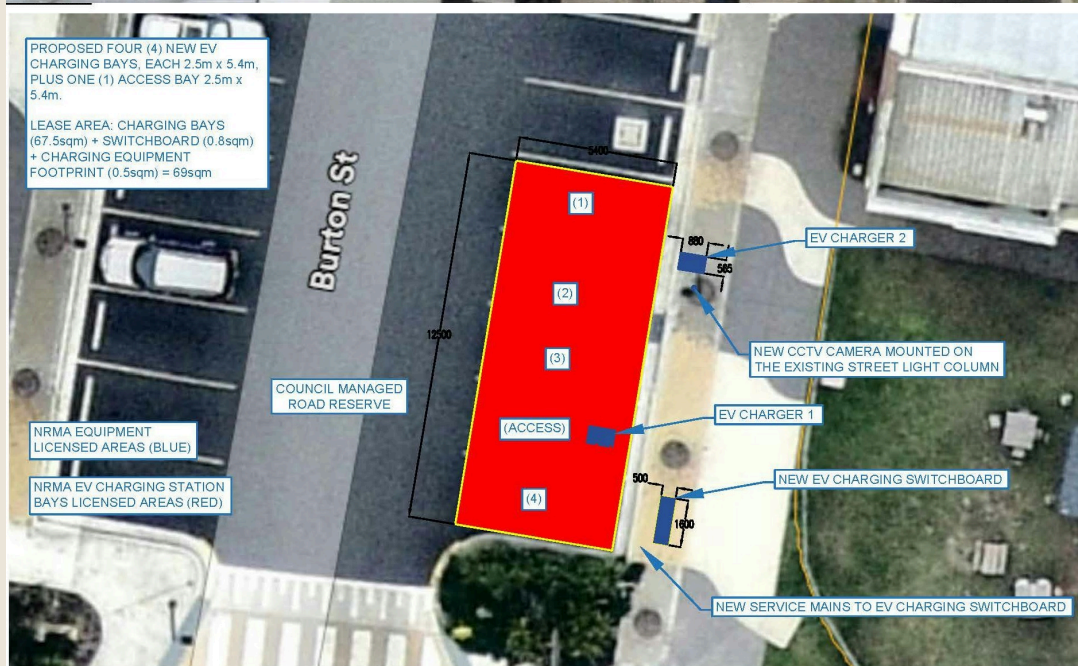
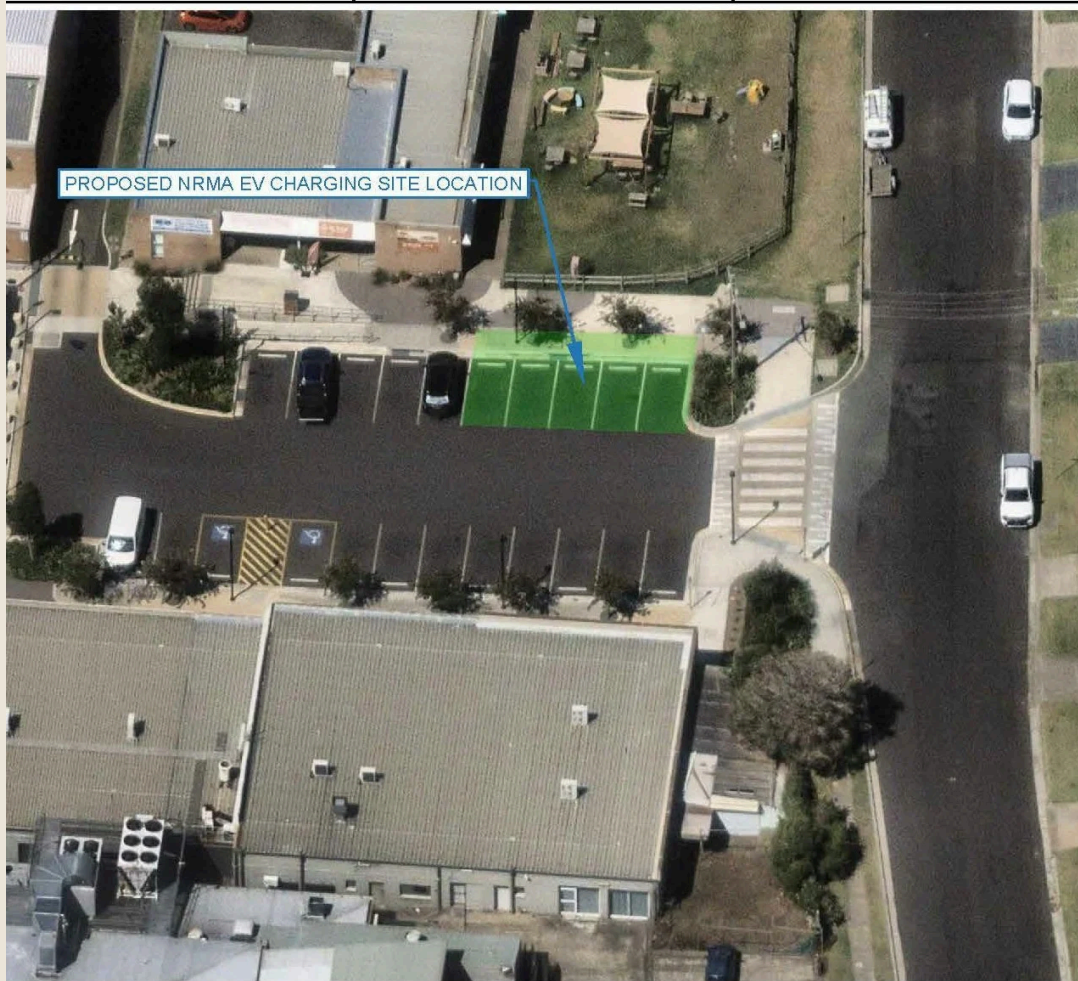
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## ELECTRIC VEHICLE (EV) CHARGING FOR BURTON STREET MALL

Council have advised an EV charging station is proposed for Burton Street mall at the Excellent Street entrance. The details

are:

\* The NRMA will be responsible for the installation, infrastructure, signage and maintenance



\* Plans provided indicate 2 Fast Charging stations on 5 car parking bays. Note: each charger has the capacity to charge 2 vehicles at the same time. It is to be confirmed whether we will commence with one, or two charging units. If we have 2 charging units, 4 vehicles can be on charge at the same time.

\* The space required will be slightly larger than the existing parking bays to accommodate disability access.

Siting: EVCharger 1 is shown in a parking bay – thought to allow for the different placements on EVs of their charging ports. Whereas EVCharger 2 seems to be sited on the pedestrian pathway.

\* Charging times & capacity: The minimum charge for fast charging is 75kW, and a typical charge takes around 15-45 minutes. The time required is influenced by the size and age of the vehicle. Newer EVs have larger battery capacities.

These chargers are not suitable for E Trucks.

## COUNCIL REVIEWS CCBs



CCBs in the Shoalhaven have joined forces and are working together to ensure community consultation continues. Options have been debated and assessed that strengthen the independence of community forums, protects volunteers, Council staff and Councillors.

Over time, legal uncertainty has emerged about the status of CCBs—specifically whether they are Council committees, or independent community groups. This lack of clarity creates legal and governance risks for both Council and participants. In response, Council has resolved to conclude the current CCB model of engagement from 1 July 2026 and consult with community and CCBs to determine the most appropriate alternative engagement model that should be for the long term.

While the CCB model has played an important role, Council is reviewing it to ensure community engagement is inclusive, effective and safe into the future.

Meetings of combined CCBs recently discussed this issue and have formulated a draft proposal to put to council

How do you feel about dogs fouling our walkways, beaches and other spaces and the dog owner makes no effort to clean it up?

It's bad when we tread on it and our shoes carry it home with us. Not only is it smelly and disgusting, but it is also a health hazard! One Vincentia family was so irritated they started their own protest:



Dog owners who don't pick up after their dog can be fined, but it is catching them at the right moment. Reporting a neighbour to authorities can often lead to ongoing hostility.

A study paper by Sydney University in June 2023 stated:

Dog faeces may contain microorganisms that cause illness in humans such as *Salmonella*, *E. coli*, *Giardia* and [internal parasites](#).

Dog poo can also be a potential reservoir for [antibiotic-resistant bacteria](#), meaning humans could develop bacterial infections that are difficult to treat through contact with dog faeces.

A recent Sydney study also identified dog faeces washed into storm water as a significant contributor to [water pollution](#).

Note: The best way to dispose of dog faeces is in the bin. Composting requires high temperatures to neutralise the nasties in dog poop; home composts are unlikely to get hot enough. Burying it simply allows microorganisms to build up in the soil.
